- *General awareness of all programs offered by CVIP.

How would you change CVIP?

- *Advertise more
- *Individual groups do not seem connected to CVIP
- *Support students/scholars financially in returning (visiting) home
- *Get more int'l students involved in CVIP
- *Send out weekly e-mails to int'l students (keeping them abreast of community happenings)

Do we need all CVIP programs?

- *Focus more on Africa
- *Be country specific (address issues specific to students from particular country)

FOCUS GROUP FINDINGS

Please note that the following is an overview of the discussion conducted by Connie and Mary. They compiled their findings in great detail in the Focus Group Report, which will serve as a baseline for CVIP to evolve and move forward.

*Why qualitative research? The purpose is to determine how to meet the needs of our international students

Three focus groups were used – 2 student, 1 community

Themes – Involvement, Communication issues, Connections to community

Coffee Hour – A place where students learned about CVIP and its groups

Scholarship – students were appreciative (financial concerns are a big issue)

Bullying and Exclusion – how do they fit in?

Volunteers – how to find them, how to retain them
