Admin Services

When complete, the Archives will be stored in the office computer and also on a secure MSU server.

Volunteer English Tutoring

As the school year draws to a close, VETP has said goodbye to some tutors and students. We will miss them very much! Two undergraduate tutors have graduated and are moving on. Another adult tutor is moving to Grand Rapids, and some others are taking the summer off.

We will have 7 conversation classes this summer, and the schedule is up and on the web site. As of right now, I have 8 conversation partners with 10 students who will be continuing this summer.

In April I received 5 applications from new tutors – 4 of whom are undergraduates! So I am interviewing them and hope to have them ready to tutor soon.

One of the undergrad tutors is using his experience as a tutor as a special project/internship. He is interested in how international students' customs are impacted when they study English and American culture.

I received 14 applications from students who would like individual conversation partners. Usually I tell them they will be on a waiting list, but I encourage them to come to our classes. Most find that the classes fill their need for conversation and friendship while they wait for a conversation partner.

This month I attended an "Active Violence Training Session" that was offered to people working in the International Center, to learn what to do if there is a violent incident on campus or in the building.

I also met with Stephanie Perentesis, MSU librarian, who attended an ESL workshop. She told me some of the highlights that she thought might be helpful with VETP, and gave me several books she got that I put with the VETP resources for tutors and students.
